DESCRIPTION One of Silicon Valley's first transit oriented developments was built on the site of the original Fairchild Semiconductor facility. The location is now home to the 425,000 square-foot corporate headquarters for Symantec—thanks to one of the Bay Area's largest brownfield restorations. Developed by Veritas Software and built on an EPA-designated Superfund Site, the project required extensive groundwater and soil remediation as well as complex legal clearances to allow the project to proceed.
